

2015-2016 PUPIL PREMIUM SPENDING IMPACT

Based pupil census Spring 2016, there are 257 pupils who qualified for Pupil Premium in 2015/16 which is 43% of the total number on role. This puts us in the 100th percentile on Raiseonline. The total amount of grant awarded was £256,380. There is no significant difference in attainment between PP and non-PP pupils in general across the academy. However, the following trends emerge when considering pupil progress: Key Stage One: PP pupils progress is broadly in line all pupils in all subjects. Key Stage Two: There is no significant difference between the two groups in maths. PP Children make less progress in Reading and Writing than non PP children.
