Staffing updates: After a long career spent in B66, Mrs Herbert (who has also taught some of our current parents) has moved on. I wish everyone connected to the school happiness and future success."*. We have the very capable and experienced Mr Hall taking over until the Summer. Parking safely: You'll have seen myself and Mr Blakey-Harris on the front gate and Mr Bahia on the side gate most mornings—this is to welcome children, but also to keep them safe from traffic and turning cars. Parents are not permitted past the first gate into the Ron Davis Centre—this is not our land, and is a dangerous place to turn cars due to the size and number of children running through. Equally the yellow lines and turning in Suffrage Street is not safe. If you need to drive, please leave earlier, or park a little further away so that you can safely walk the final part.

Sandwell Youth Parliament: We are extremely proud that one of our pupils who left us last year to join King Edwards has been selected as a candidate to join the Sandwell Youth Parliament. MMR and Measles at VPA: I've spoken to Sandwell Public Health again this week—they've identified 80 children who attend VPA who **HAVEN'T** had an MMR Vaccination. They will send through the list of names as well as 80 Parental Consent forms for us to pass on. They will then come into school on **Wednesday March 6th** to provide the Vaccine. If you receive a consent form, or if you think any of your children still need the Vaccine to keep them safe, please do return it and attend on the 6th. There have now been confirmed cases of measles amongst children and young adults in local Smethwick schools.

As Winter bugs and sickness still linger, please can we support teaching good hygiene at home, 2 minute-hand washing and covering mouths and noses when we cough and sneeze.

Year 6 SATs meetings: As May approaches, teachers in Year 6 are hosting a series of events and workshops to help parents to support children at home. This afternoon's 6MA INSPIRE session will model some of the revision strategies and questions types that children will face. 6JD' have INSPIRE scheduled for 6 March and 6MC 14 March.

Next **Tuesday, 27 February at 3.30** will be a chance for all parents in Y6 to find out more about the process, the timetable, and strategies for keeping children calm during the lead up and the week of tests themselves.

World book day, Thursday 7th March: Many schools will be distributing the £1 book tokens this week however thanks to **phenomenal** effort from teachers (led by Mrs Yale whilst on her maternity leave), all children have been surveyed to choose the Free Book of their choice. We have exchanged all vouchers in advance so that children receive these on the day! This means families don't have to go to book shops and no favourite books will have run out! The day will be packed again with opportunities for children to interact with new books bought specifically for the event, hear stories read, swap teachers, swap classes and select new class texts to buy and share. We plan and fund these events rather than ask children to dress up, to maximise their interaction with books, and minimise cost to families as part of our Poverty Proofing Charter.

Hardship fund and local support: We recognise that the Freecycle events and Foodbank stall outside school have not been as frequent this year—this is because our suppliers and community projects have not had the surplus to donate.
